Anatoly L. Adamishin. Born 1934. Ph.D. (European politics and economy). Vice President, International Affairs, «SISTEMA» Joint-Stock Financial Corporation (Moscow). He was Deputy Foreign Minister in the USSR, Ambassador to Rome, First Deputy Foreign Minister in the Russian Federation, Ambassador to London, and Minister of the Russian Federation for CIS countries cooperation.
